BACKGROUND

A package of legislative reforms in 2013 directed school districts to report LAP student data annually. Districts identify students in CEDARS and report student data in EDS. The reforms also included a substantial increase in state LAP funding and a directive for districts to focus LAP programming first on K–4 literacy.

In summer 2015, the U.S. Department of Education released guidance allowing Title I, Part A schoolwide (SW) programs the flexibility to use Title I, Part A funds in lieu of LAP funds to meet *the K-4 literacy first focus*.

To demonstrate to the Legislature that the 2013 LAP funding increase led to an increase in interventions for students in K–4 literacy, districts using Title I, Part A schoolwide funds in lieu of LAP will report students receiving K–4 literacy interventions through the Title I, Part A schoolwide as LAP participants AND Title I, Part A SW students. As this is a new requirement, and to minimize confusion, the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) provided the above scenarios for reporting LAP and Title I, Part A students in CEDARS and EDS.
